Will it affect the drainage of my yard or my neighbor's yard


Is there a place to hang a TV

And there is more... Flooring, Ceiling, Columns, Finishes...





Wait, haven't I made enough decisions already? No, there are so many details that need to be decided. What style is your home and how can we make your project look original to your home? Here are a few more details to take into consideration.

Flooring — concrete, stamped or stained concrete, tile, travertine, pavers, flagstone, wood decking, composite decking...

Ceiling— Hardie that is painted to match the home, cedar, stained wood, reclaimed wood. And then the decision of dropped, vaulted, coffered, with trim, with beams...

Columns— Plain columns that are painted to match the home, cedar, round, square, brick or stone (full column or half column with wood on top),

Lighting— can lights, special lighting, carriage lights for the columns, lighting over the kitchen area, a chandelier ...

Kitchen—appliances, counter choice, storage needed, stone or brick fascia...

Fire feature—full fireplace or a fire pit, gas or wood burning, what kind of mantle, stone or brick, hearth...
